NYC to Get E-bike Charging Stations After Fatal Battery Fires

New York City is allocating \$25 million for safe e-bike charging stations in public housing to combat the growing number of deadly lithium-ion battery fires.



So far this year, 13 New Yorkers have lost their lives and 71 others were injured in e-bike fires caused by batteries. Using the wrong chargers (universal chargers), faulty or damaged batteries, over charging are some of the causes. Be careful with your bateries & monitor them. Be especially careful of dropping them. If you smell an electrical fire, if your battery is warm or hot to the touch, is the surface if bulging and the paint/surface has bubbled, take the battery to a qualified repairman. It's also important to take your battery to a recycle facility when it needs to be discarded. Throwing it away could start a dump fire.

Fires from lithium batteries are especially difficult to extinguish due to a chemical reaction. A faulty battery can burst into flames or actually explode if it comes in contact with water.

So, be sure the charger you're using is one that is made specifically your battery. Don't use "universal chargers." Check your battery often for signs of damage like a bulging or blistering surface, or warmth well after the time it's been used. It's also suggested that your battery be charged away from the

interior of your house, preferably somewhere away from other flammables. Check your battery often.

Happy Independence Day, and remember kids, please don't set off any fireworks. Leave that to the adults that have been drinking all day.
